

MINISTER'S LETTER

THE WORK OF THE HOLY SPIRIT II

In the previous article on the "Work of the Holy Spirit" we saw how the Spirit works in people to bring them to Christ in the new birth. In this article we shall explore what the Spirit does in the born-again believer. It will be needful to emphasize that there is a difference between what the Spirit does in the unbeliever and what he does in the believer. The primary work of the Spirit in unbelievers is to convict them of their sins and bring them to faith in Christ. In the believer however, the Spirit enables them to be in continual fellowship with God.

Our Lord Jesus taught extensively on the work the Spirit does in the life of the believer in the gospel of John. In John 14 v26 our Lord said,

"But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you".

We learn three precious facts from the above scripture

1. The Holy Spirit is called "helper." He is with us and dwells in us permanently to help us with all we do. We can depend on his help emotionally, mentally, physically, and spiritually. How comforting to know that God is not far away in heaven but dwells in us (closer to us than our breath) through this Holy Spirit to HELP us in all our endeavor's. When we look in the Bible, we see great things that people accomplished through the help of the Holy Spirit. Dear friend you have all the help you need. That help is available through the Holy Spirit. If you have truly received Christ as Lord and saviour his Holy Spirit is in you to give you all the help you need.
2. Secondly, we learn from the above scripture that the Holy Spirit will teach us **ALL THINGS**. The Spirit is our teacher. When you read the Bible, he will teach you what it means and how to apply it in your daily life. Without the teaching of the Holy Spirit you may have some intellectual facts from the Bible and sermons, but it will hardly be of any practical benefit to you. When you hear a sermon, he will teach you what it means and how to apply it to your daily life. The Holy Spirit will teach you how to do your work in your profession, how to be a good wife or husband or parent. How to manage your affairs in life, how to walk with God. Remember Jesus said, "He will teach you **ALL THINGS**".
3. The third truth we learn from the scripture quoted above is that the Holy Spirit will bring to our memory what Christ says. The Book of James says that if we hear God's word and forget it, we deceive ourselves. Sometimes we think that because we have been to church, we are blessed! That is true only if we remember what we learned in church. Consider the scripture below:



But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was. But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty and continues in it, and is not a forgetful hearer but a doer of the work, this one will be blessed in what he does. James 1. 22- 25

Merely hearing or reading God's word makes us deceive ourselves! Because we imagine we are blessed when we are not in any way better. Perhaps we are even worse off because we are deceiving ourselves. The one who has not heard God's word is under no illusion. A person may hear from God's word that "God will supply all our need" and rejoice but when they are in need they forget the word and start to mourn and mope and be anxious. The Solution to the problem of forgetting God's word is the work of the Holy Spirit in reminding us of what God has said continually in our daily lives. Let us continually ask and implore the Holy Spirit to do in our lives the work he came to do. No promise of God works automatically in our lives. We must know the promise, believe it and claim it in prayer through faith. - **To be continued**

“Once in royal David’s city” – some thoughts

We shall still be in the Christmas period in the liturgical year when this issue of the magazine is published so we are going to explore a few thoughts on this well-known carol which is 214 in Singing the Faith. It is the carol which is traditionally sung at the beginning of many carol services.

Verse 1

*Once in royal David’s city
Stood a lowly cattle shed,
where a mother laid her baby
In a manger for his bed:
Mary was that mother mild,
Jesus Christ her little child.*

Have you noticed that the city is not named? It was Bethlehem, and its description as a city is in contrast to the writer of “O little town of Bethlehem” (STF 213) who describes it as being small. Which was it? It was in fact a humble small town about 6 miles south of Jerusalem. Because of its important connection with royalty the writer of this carol uses poetic licence in describing it as a city to emphasise its importance.

Bethlehem was also known as Ephrathah and was the place to which God directed Samuel to visit, to anoint David as a future king of Israel. (1 Samuel 16 v1-13)

Years before, it was the town to which Ruth, a non-Jewess, returned as a widow with her mother-in-law. Here she met a relative, Boaz, who she married. Through their son Obed, she became the great grandmother of king David.

The prophet Micah prophesied that out of Bethlehem would come “one who would be ruler over Israel, whose origins were of old” (Micah 5 v2)

Seven hundred years later this prophecy was fulfilled with the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. Matthew traces the ancestry of Joseph back to David and beyond, and by a different route Luke traces the ancestry of Mary back to David.

Verse 2

*He came down to earth from heaven
who is God and Lord of all,
and his shelter was a stable,
and his cradle was a stall;
with the needy, poor and lowly
lived on earth our Saviour holy.*

This verse asserts the fact that Jesus was coexistent with his father before his coming to earth in human form.

In the gospel of John, we read these words “In the beginning was the Word (Jesus), and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that was made.” (John 1 v1-3)

In a prayer to his father, Jesus confirmed his pre-existence when he prayed “you loved me before the creation of the world.” (John 17 v24)

Jesus left the glory of being with his father in heaven to be born humbly in a manger. After Herod had given orders for all boys in Bethlehem under two years of age to be killed, Joseph and Mary took Jesus to Egypt where they became refugees. The rejection of Jesus began right from the time of his birth. (Matthew 2 v13-15)

His entry into the world was lowly and not what would be expected of someone who is king of kings. During his ministry he reached out to the sick, bereaved, and outcasts.

Later on, during his ministry, he said to a would-be follower, “The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head” (Matthew 8 v21)

Verse 3


*And our eyes at last shall see him,
through his own redeeming love.
for that child so dear and gentle
is our Lord in heaven above:
and he leads his children on
to the place where he has gone.*

The verse opens with the assurance that we shall see him in heaven which is possible through his redeeming love. In the gospel of John, we read these words “God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.” (John 3 v16)

It is this love of God which sent his son to the cross to redeem the world.

At his ascension, Jesus returned to his father in heaven, and it is to there that he leads us. During his ministry on earth Jesus taught the way of life his followers should adopt if they wished to be true disciples.

The way for us to have the hope and assurance of being with him in heaven is to respond positively to those words from the gospel of John, quoted above, by acknowledging that we are sinful, accept the forgiveness which he offers, and seek to walk in his way from day to day.



Verse 4

*Not in that poor lowly stable,
with the oxen standing by,
we shall see him; but in heaven,
set at God's right hand on high;
there his children gather round
bright like stars, with glory crowned.*

We are reminded in this verse that we shall have to wait until we reach heaven before we can see him. The verse confirms the confidence we can have in looking forward to a place in heaven.

One of the teachings of John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist church, was that we can have this assurance.

When Jesus was on the cross, one of the criminals who was on a cross beside him realised who Jesus was and asked him to remember him when he came to his kingdom. Jesus replied, "Today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23 v42-43)

Finally, the last two lines allude to the glory of being with Christ in heaven.

Jesus took Peter, James and John up a mountain where he was transfigured before them. This means that his appearance completely changed. "The appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. Two men, Moses and Elijah, appeared in glorious splendour, talking with Jesus. (Luke 9 v30-31). This experience reminded Jesus of the glory he had left behind, and which would be his when he returned to the Father. It would give him strength to endure the agony which was to follow. It also gave the disciples a glimpse of the glory of heaven.

Christmas at Lyndon 2025

Christmas at Lyndon this year started early with the Christmas Fayre at the end of November.

This year's theme was based around the Nutcracker, and Nutcracker soldiers started to appear round the centre from the middle of November as planning and preparations got under way. By the time we got to the date of the fayre itself, there were nutcracker soldiers lining the corridor of the church centre, standing guard in the passage between the main church and the centre and outside the Wesley room which had been magically transformed into Santa's grotto as the big man himself also made an appearance, welcoming children (and adults!) in to come and speak to him and giving them a small gift.



We had loads of different stalls both in the main hall and in the church, encompassing many different things including gifts, Christmas items, handicrafts, chocolate, books, groceries, face painting and, one of my favourites, the cake stall! The kitchen was also well used selling bacon and sausage rolls and hot drinks, including hot chocolate loaded with cream and marshmallows! We also had a plethora of competitions including a raffle, guess the weight of the Christmas cake and guess the number of sweets in the jar which all went down well.



We were again serenaded in the church by the excellent Song Squad from Olton Primary School.

Over £750 was raised to go into church funds which was a great achievement. Thanks must go again this year to Rebecca Marks who spearheaded the Fayre again this year as well as to all those other people who offered up their time and services to ensure that the Fayre was a success.

On the third Sunday of Advent, Rev Ribiero led our gift service. This year we were asked to supply gifts of chocolate and toiletries for the children of Lyndon House, a respite centre for children with learning disabilities which is based just up the road from our church.



Our crib service this year was very different with not a crib in site as we focussed on the words from the book of Isaiah predicting the coming of Jesus, using a drama set in Isaiah's Place with 3 trainee caretakers, or Deputy Assistant Broad Responsibility Officers, speculating on the nature of the special delivery that had been prophesied by Isaiah, ending with the remark "You're not going to believe what's just happened in the stable". Adults and children alike were given the opportunity to make coloured candles reflecting the fact that Jesus is the light of the world. We sang a relatively new carol, This Child, using a YouTube version to support us, which is sung in a calypso-type rhythm, and ended singing O Come and Join the Dance, a carol we have sung before, but this time we were led by Jo Hancock singing the lead part with the rest of the congregation answering her

which seemed to go down very well. It is unusual to get a round of applause in a service, but this service resulted in two!!



This year's candlelit carol service was well attended and the church looked amazing in the glow of candlelight. This was the traditional service of lessons and carols reflecting the whole of the Christmas story. After the service, people congregated in the lounge



for refreshments and to continue the fellowship.

For the first time for a few years, we also held a Christmas Eve communion service, although this was held earlier in the evening than normal. The service was a joint service with RCCG (The Redeemed Christian Church of God) who also worship in our building. The service was jointly led by both Rev Joseph Ribiero and Pastor Kenny and members of both churches, as well as members from South Yardley Methodist Church also attended.

There was no service at Lyndon on Christmas Day, but members were invited to attend the service held at South Yardley Methodist church, led by Rev Joseph Ribiero.

There will also be another joint service on 31st December, New Year's Eve, which at the time of

writing this article had not yet taken place. Again, the service will be led by the ministers of both churches, and I pray that it will be well attended.

The collection at the Carols by Candlelight and Christmas Eve services was for the benefit of the South Yardley pantry and over £275 was raised which I am sure will be gratefully received.

The church was also used for nativity services by Olton Primary School children from year 1 and year 2, and by children from a local nursery.

Once again, a busy Advent and Christmas season for Lyndon.

I am sat here writing this article on Christmas Eve – in the lull before the storm of Christmas – and have just read my latest update from CAP – reflecting upon some of the results that have been possible in 2025 thanks to the generosity of supporters and the work undertaken by countless volunteers from numerous churches: -



1,987+

people accepted prayer for the first time



543+

people accessed the wider support of the local church



382

people came along to a church service for the first time



140

people said 'yes' to following Jesus for the first time



1,062+

people accepted a Bible or gospel tract

people recommitted their lives to Jesus

This year I have started a volunteer role with a local CAP Debt Centre that sees me, in my role as a Befriender, accompanying a CAP Debt Manager visiting people – referred to as clients - who have reached out for help. We generally meet the person needing help in their home at a time of their choosing and we listen to them as they tell us about the position they are in. Our role is to re-assure them that they don't need to feel alone in facing the issues confronting them, that help is at hand, that their situation can be resolved and that there is always a way out of the position they are in. The hardest part is usually hearing what the client has had to go through and the challenges they have had to endure. Often, they are things completely outside of their own control and you realise how these situations could come upon any of us. There but for the Grace of God is the saying that springs to mind.

Then begins the task of assembling all the details of the debts the client is facing so that the folks at CAP's offices can reach out to the person's creditors to say CAP are working with the client to construct a repayment plan – this usually buys some breathing space – the chasing letters and threatening phone calls stop and the bailiffs stop appearing at the front door. Once the whole picture is confirmed, a practical solution is agreed with the client – usually a repayment plan or sometimes other solutions are needed. Once all are agreed, the client can then hopefully stick to the plan and eventually clear their debts.

Along the journey they are supported by the Debt manager, a Befriender and are usually introduced to folks from the local church providing the Debt Centre service.

Many clients become involved to some degree with the church, and the figures above bear rich testament to the power of God in their lives.

I have found it incredibly rewarding work and look forward to meeting more people who need CAP's help in the coming years.

The church at which the Debt Centre I am working with is based – St Lukes in Central Birmingham, also invited me to help out with their annual Christmas hamper delivery yesterday. Over 150 hampers were delivered to some of the neediest families in central Birmingham. God's work is truly alive and being done.



As I sit here now and look forward to tomorrow and sharing Christmas Day with Katie and Adam, a final reflection on the Christmas story, which also leapfrogs us forward into Easter – all will become clear – from Andy Smith (no relation), Head of Discipleship, Christians Against Poverty:-

“Compared to the other characters we’ve met, Jesus only makes an appearance right at the end of the Christmas story! And yet it is his act of self-giving which makes the whole story a miracle.

Jesus was with the Father at the moment of creation. He had the very highest place in heaven, and he laid his glory aside, emptying himself ‘of all but love’ as Charles Wesley tells us. He was born in an ordinary family, to live a human life, and

ultimately to die on the cross.

Through his generous love, we can receive free and full forgiveness, a new start in this life, and eternal life with him. With such love and sacrifice given to us, what can we give in return?

In the hymn 'When I survey the wondrous cross', Isaac Watts writes:

**'Were the whole realm of nature mine
That were an offering far too small.
Love so amazing, so divine
Demands my soul, my life, my all.'**

In response to this generous love of our Saviour, we must offer our love to God and to those who need his love so desperately. The world is full of desperate people who do not know where to turn. Some of them turn to CAP, and the churches that partner with CAP"

So, thank you to you for your support and your on-going encouragement to me.




A Lesson Learnt

Teaching in a large Birmingham nursery school certainly had its lighter moments!


I had been asked to lead the morning session of a staff training day in which I'd guide younger, inexperienced colleagues towards useful end of year assessments to send up to "big school".

I'd settled on drawing a picture of a person as one of them, so I sat my challenging group of children down one Monday morning and provided them with drawing materials. (My group of children contained the ones with the most difficult behaviour and learning problems because I was an experienced and qualified teacher.) We sang, "Head, shoulders, knees and toes", together (well more or less!) to (hopefully!) use up any excess energy. I then asked the children to look very carefully at me and draw what they could see.

For a couple of children, a quick circle with two sticks pointing down or outwards was all they could produce i.e.



Most children spent a little longer on their drawings and proudly pointed out eyes, nose, arms, legs, hair etc.



One serious and conscientious little girl was still working on her drawing quite a while after the others had gone off to play. I asked her to show it to me and found a large number of lines (wrinkles!) drawn all over my face! I asked her what they were and she very gently touched the 'laughter lines' on my face.

That drawing went up on the staffroom noticeboard with "Guess Who?" written underneath to make us all smile on darker days.

Needless to say, I never asked the children to draw me again!!


